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WORLD IMMUNISATION WEEK 2024

Protected before the first breath: Pertussis vaccination during pregnancy

From 24 to 30 April, the world celebrates World Immunization Week 2024, this year under the theme "Humanly possible: Saving lives through immunisation". The motto emphasises the vital role of vaccines in enabling children to not only survive but thrive. One crucial immunisation highlighted in this context is the pertussis vaccination during pregnancy, which provides dual protection for both mother and infant. The infant may gain passive immunisation in utero against a potentially lifethreatening pertussis infection from birth. Please note that all materials and the campaign website are in German.

INVESTING IN NEONATAL HEALTH

Every newborn counts, everywhere: An emotional call to action to save the lives of



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millions of newborns

A recent commentary from the 2023 Congress of joint European Neonatal societies (jENS) highlights the precarious global statistics regarding newborn health. Each year, 2.3 million newborns die, and 1.9 million stillbirths occur; 98% of these cases take place in countries of the Global South. This is a devastating number of lives lost, most of which could have been prevented. The commentary discusses why it is so important for us all to join forces and suggests ways to tackle this silent epidemic.

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NUTRITION DURING PREGNANCY

Reducing the risk of preterm birth through adapted supplementation nutrition during pregnancy

The Child Health Foundation released a new clinical practice guideline for the supplementation of omega-3 fatty acids during pregnancy, revealing great potential. A balanced diet with omega-3 fatty acids can reduce the risk of preterm birth and especially early preterm birth by up to 50-60%. The guideline offers explicit recommendations on how women can meet their omega-3 fatty acid needs and how healthcare professionals can support this safe, low-cost, and effective measure to prevent preterm birth.

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IMMUNISATION DURING PREGNANCY

Evaluating the safety and effects of Covid-19 vaccination during pregnancy

Pregnant women are especially vulnerable to falling severely ill with a Covid-19 infection, which can have a negative impact on the pregnancy outcome and drastically increase the risk of preterm delivery or stillbirth. Therefore, a safe vaccination status not only protects the infected mother, but potentially saves the infant's life. To examine the safety of vaccination during pregnancy, six cohorts from three countries across the world were reviewed. The data highlights the protective potential of the Covid-19 vaccination and reassures that a vaccination during pregnancy does not increase the risk of preterm birth.

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FOLLOW-UP AND CONTINUING CARE

European-wide reference standards can be a means to advancing infant and child health

Two new videos highlight the importance of follow-up and continuing care for preterm infants and their families. Professor Dieter Wolke, Chair of the Topic Expert Group on "Follow-up and continuing care", and Dr Britta Hüning, Vice Chair, share insights on the imperative for unified reference standards across Europe. They emphasise the necessity of monitoring a child's development from infancy into adulthood to ensure appropriate and comprehensive medical, developmental, and psychological support. Continuous, high-quality healthcare support is essential for children with potential or recurring health challenges to improve long-term outcomes for preterm and hospitalised infants.

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VACCINATION IN PRETERM INFANTS

Same shot, same schedule: Vaccination equality for preterm and full-term infants

Delayed immunisation among preterm infants leaves them vulnerable to preventable diseases. Despite their increased susceptibility due to underdeveloped immune systems, research shows that preterm infants can mount adequate immune responses to vaccinations. However, delays often occur due to concerns about safety and lack of understanding among healthcare providers and parents. A review article by dos Santos Rodrigues Sadeck and de Ávila Kfouri addresses this problem, suggesting the need for comprehensive guidelines and improved dissemination of knowledge among healthcare professionals and families alike.
